Shipmate and former captain, John Denham reports that work on having another Navy ship named Ozbourn is progressing slowly. John is having difficulty obtaining support information from the Navy

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
MY FIRST FIREBALL!

REUNION 2001 UPDATE (OCT. 17-21, 2001)

The reunion site is Seekonk, MA which is near Providence, RI. From this point we will be able to visit Battleship Cove in Fall River, MA, the location of the destroyer USS Joseph P Kennedy Jr. (DD850) and the battleship USS Massachusetts (BB59). Tours of both ships and a Memorial Service and Dinner have been arranged.

Boston is the destination for the following day with a visit to the old Charlestown Navy Yard where the Ozbourn was first commissioned in 1946. Located here is the USS Cassin Young (DD793) and the relic USS Constitution, the oldest commissioned ship in the Navy. Lunch is to be held in Dorchester, MA followed by a visit to the John F. Kennedy Library. On Saturday a tour of the Mansions in Newport, RI has been arranged with the Banquet to follow back in Seekonk that evening.

Contracts have been signed and deposits made on all functions with the exception of transportation which will be completed sometime after January 1st.

Korea Service Medal Eligibility

Many shipmates may be eligible to receive the Korea Service Medal. To be eligible, military personnel must have served between 25 June 1950 and 27 July 1953; have been on permanent assignment or on temporary duty for 30 consecutive days or 60 non-consecutive days; and performed their duties within the territorial limits of Korea, in the waters immediately adjacent thereto, or in aerial flight over Korea participating in actual combat

The Air Force is handling distribution and medals applied for through the year 2003. Service members should provide a copy of discharge papers (DD214 or DD215) or the National Guard equivalent (NGB Form 22). 

Bob Whitten wrote:

Sally and I attended the commemoration of the beginning of the Korean War that was held in Reno, NV on 25 June. The afternoon event featured an hour and a half performance of Korean dancers from various Korean universities followed by the presentation of the medals struck by the Republic of Korea government and finally authorized by the U.S. Army for wearing on uniforms. The medal was first issued nearly half a century ago and accepted by all of the nations involved in the United Nations effort except the United States. The U.S. Army does move slowly!

The evening event was a formal affair at the Reno Hilton with various speakers including the admiral commanding the Naval Strike Warfare Center at Fallon

NV and a former governor who is a Korean War veteran. The whole affair was exceptionally well done (subsidized by local philanthropists) and well worth the drive to Reno. Quite by chance, our table had couples representing each of the services.

The following letter was received by E-mail and is considered to be of such an inspiring nature that it is included in it's entirety.

Subject: TAPS

Hello,

My name is John A. Fornbacher Jr. I am writing to inform you of the passing of my father John Andrew Fornbacher Sr. (BM3/c) on October 27, 1999. He was on the Fireball! mailing list and I know that he was a crewmember on the Ozbourn however, I am not sure for how long and can only guess early to mid 50's. He enlisted in 1945 at wars end and got out in 1949 and then back in that same year or a year later (I remember he said he spent a year in the reserves and then went active again). He mentioned several destroyers that he served on such as the USS Mervine (DD489 later reclassified DMS31), Hancock (?), and perhaps one or two McCook, Cunningham, others to include the Ozbourn (DD846). remember correctly, in the movie starring Humphrey Bogart, "Caine Mutiny", there is a scene where two naval officers are standing on the pier and one of them mentions "there goes the 'ole Ozbourn". I think it is near the beginning of the film. I mention this because I always remember my Dad telling me when I was little and watching that movie with him that he served on the Ozbourn and I think he said that he may have

been on board about the time that the movie was filmed so I would guess that he may have served on Ozbourn in 1955-1956 before he got out of the Navy to marry my mother (Eleanor Connor). My Dad loved the Navy very much and often made mention of navy life as I was growing up. Always he would tell me like the "old salty Boatswainsmates" would say, "there are only two ways to do things around here, my way and the Navy way, and I got news for you, my way is the Navy way!!!"He would tell me of some actions he had seen over in Korea when I would press him for information. I love my Dad very much even though he may have been somewhat of a hellraiser and I will always miss him and all that he taught me from his service in the Navy. If I may ask one last request and that would be if you would send a copy of the "FIREBALL!" newsletter that includes my fathers name in the "TAPS" section to my mother in Pleasant Hill, CA. TINCAN TRIVIA

Did you know. ??

USS Gearing (DD 710), lead ship of the Gearing class of which Ozbourn is a part, was named in honor of three generations of the same family of naval officers. Henry Chalfant Gearing was born in 1855 and graduated from the Naval Academy in 1876 (the year after Curt Anderson) and served in many ships and stations until retirement in 1909. Henry C. Gearing Jr. was born in 1887, graduated from the Naval Academy in 1907 and served on active duty until his death in 1944. Henry C. Gearing III was born in 1912, graduated from the Naval Academy in 1935 and was lost with his ship the USS Juneau (CL 52) in 1942 during the Naval Battle of Guadalcanal. Surely, an honorable name for a great class of ship.

MORE OZBOURN HISTORY

On 3 December 1968 Ozbourn entered Long Beach Naval Shipyard for a four month regular overhaul and emerged on 29 Mar. 1969 with replacement gun mounts and ASROC launcher together with an enlarged electronic counter measures suite. On 25 April the ship reported to the Fleet Training Group of the Pacific Fleet for six weeks of intensive refresher training in preparation for the upcoming West Pac deployment. Two days after completion of RefTra on 6 June Ozbourn, together with other ships of her division, sailed for Portland, OR to participate in the annual Rose Festival and upon return to home port Long Beach, continued final preparations for deployment. 26 Sept. found Ozbourn under way in company with other units of DesDiv 92 for the long anticipated deployment to the Western Pacific.

With stopovers in Hawaii and Midway Island the ship continued on to arrive in Yokosuka, Japan on 15 October. During this time operational control was shifted from COM FIRST FLT to the Seventh Fleet.

The ship departed Yokosuka on 18 Oct. via Buckner Bay, Okinawa to take up Naval Gunfire Support duties in the I Corps area, Republic of Vietnam arriving at Da Nang on 24 Oct. Throughout the next thirty days Ozbourn remained on the gun line providing gunfire support around the DMZ and the I Corps area. During this period 22 replenishments were conducted and 6,569 rounds of 5 inch ammunition was expended.

Ordered North, the ship fueled at Kaohsiung, and then sailed through the Taiwan Straits into the East China Sea in order to conduct ASW operations with the USS Menhaden (SS377) on 5 Dec. Following this operation, Ozbourn joined the screening unit attached to the USS Coral Sea which then proceeded through the Tsushima Straits to take up radar picket stations in the Sea Of Japan. Upon detachment from these duties she proceeded to port in Sasebo, Japan for a weeks upkeep and repairs.

Christmas 1969 found the ship in Hong Kong and New Years day 1970 in the port of Keelung, Taiwan until 2 Jan. 1970 when she departed for the Tonkin Gulf riding "shot gun" for the USS Constellation (CVA64). This assignment lasted for about three weeks when the ship departed the area for the 1200 mile trip for a well earned R&R in exotic Bangkok, Thailand, arriving on 2 Feb.1970. After a satisfying 5 day stopover Ozbourn was once again underway to join the USS Hancock (CV19), first for operations in the South China Sea then proceeding northward to the Okinawa area before once again arriving at Yokosuka. After taking on provisions and fuel Ozbourn was underway for homeport Long Beach arriving on 1 April, 1970.


This abridged account of the Ozbourn's 1969 WestPac deployment was provided by shipmate Pat Bohenko RM2 (68-70). He went on to say that he had missed some of the details but mentioned a brush with a typhoon while enroute to Subic Bay that caused more than a few upset stomachs while it lasted. Mr. Bohenko left the Navy in November 1970.

Our thanks to Pat for sharing this most interesting account of his cruise to the Western Pacific during one of the most turbulent periods of our time.

OZBOURN'S LOST HISTORY RECOVERED

Some of the missing years from Ozbourn's

history has been uncovered thanks to Craig Chaddock of San Diego, CA. In 1973, Craig was a Cub Scout in a den with the son of former Ozbourn Commanding Officer Kenneth L. Costilow. Craig wrote to the ship requesting information and received an 8x10 color photo and a 24 page history of the ship encompassing the years 1946 through 1972. Craig found our web page some time ago and donated both items to the Ozbourn Association. The history is complete through Ozbourn's last WESTPAC deployment that ended in October 1972. It has been digitized and is now included on the web site on the history page. Members from the 1968-1972 era can now refresh their memories on the ship's activities when they were on board. Gradually, the entire ship's history is being collected and published for the benefit of all hands.
