Fraud Alert

s many of you may know, a very serious threat to every veterans' security and personal affairs occurred on May 3. A Veterans Affairs employee from the Washington, D.C. area took a laptop computer home with him which was eventually stolen. It contained vital information on more than 26 million veterans.

Fortunately, the stolen computer equipment was recovered on or about June 28. A preliminary examination indicated that the data was not accessed or duplicated.

Michael McGowan, director of digital forensics at tech security consultant Stroz Friedberg, says there are simple ways to access data stealthily. "It's very possible to do it without leaving a trace," he said.

Nearly 27 million veterans' data were stolen recently from a laptop that a VA person wrongly had in his home. No clear word yet from the govt. on depth of problems with identity theft. You may want to consider this proactive protection. You can place a 90-day credit alert on your accounts with the three natl. credit reporting agencies. By signing up with one, you automatically sign up with all three. This requires them to contact you to verify that it's you asking for new sources of credit during this period. Not foolproof, but a hedge. In addition, you are entitled by law to request a free credit report annually from each agency. You may want to place the 90-day alert, and then request the report to be sure nothing has gone wrong. Identity theft can take years to fix if it happens to you. Experian - www.experian.com

About the Ozbourn Association —

- I. **NAME:** The name of the organization is the USS OZBOURN ASSOCIATION, herein after referred to as the Association.
- II. **PURPOSE:** The purpose of the Association is to further the friendship, camaraderie, fellowship, association and communication between its members on a non-profit basis.
- III. MEMBERSHIP: Regular membership in the Association is limited to those members of the Naval Service who served on board USS OZBOURN (DD 846) during the period of her commissioned service as a ship of the United states Navy. Honorary members of the Association may be elected by a majority vote of the elected officers of the Association or by majority vote of the regular members attending a reunion.

60TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE USS OZBOURN (DD 846)

This article is the second in a series of three articles relating to the history of the U.S.S. Ozbourn. The spring 2006 issue covered the chronological history between 1944 and 1955. This issue will cover the years between 1956 and 1964. The fall 2006 issue of the *Fireball* will report on the last decade of the "Oz" from 1965 to her decommissioning in December 1975. The photographs that appear in this and the next issue of the *Fireball* may have been taken any time between 1944 and 1975.



The photo at left appeared in the December 28, 1945 publication of *The Bulletin*, Bath Iron Works, Bath Maine. The photo caption taken from that publication is shown below.

1956

The Ozbourn returned to San Diego on 11 March 1956 and entered Mare Island Naval Shipyard in April for a major overhaul. Upon completion of the overhaul on 23 June, she returned to San Diego for six weeks of intensive training. In September, the Ozbourn departed again for her yearly tour of duty in the Far East. The ship visited New Zealand, Pago Pago, Munua Island and other ports, normally visited while in the in the Far East. 1957

The Ozbourn returned from its West Pac cruise to its home port in San Diego on 21 March 1957. During the summer, the Ozbourn visited Portland, Oregon as a guest of the Portland Rose Festival. The ship then visited Seattle, Washington to take part in the Seattle Sea Fair. As a reminder, the next biennial reunion will take place in Seattle, September 12-16 2007.

Commander Toulon was relieved as commanding officer by Commander Charles A. Kuhl in September. On 25 October, the ship departed for Brisbane, Australia for a seven-day visit. Afterward, the Ozbourn went to Japan for duty with the Seventh Fleet.

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1958

After its overseas tour of duty, the Ozbourn returned to San Diego on 23 April 1958. Between April and June, the ship operated off the coast of San Diego. In June, the ship went to Mare Island Naval Shipyard for a three-month overhaul. By September, the Ozbourn returned to San Diego for Refresher Training. On 17 December, the ship departed for the Western Pacific.

1959

While operating with the Seventh Fleet the Ozbourn participated in Exercise "Seademon," an exercise conducted in

The National Purple Heart Hall of Honor is the first in the nation to recognize the more than 800,000 Americans wounded or killed in action while serving in the United States military. April with members from participating SEATO nations. Before returning to the United States, the ship went southward to Australia to take part in the Battle of the Coral Sea celebration, visiting Adelaide, Perth and Darwin, Australia. The Ozbourn returned to San Diego on 13 June.

Commander Kuhl was relieved as commanding officer by Commander William W. Turner on 1 July. The Ozbourn conducted local operations in the San Diego area from June 1959 through February 1960. On 23 September 1959, the Oz was privileged to serve as the flagship for Read Admiral Luis Gomez, Commanderin-Chief of the Navy of Ecuador while Destroyer Division 112 demonstrated antisubmarine warfare tactics.

1960

In February 1960, the ship departed for duty in the Western Pacific. The ship returned to San Diego on 14 June and operated locally in the San Diego area. In August, the Ozbourn trained 10 NROTC students from various colleges throughout the country for four weeks. In October, the ship visited San Francisco to participate in the Pacific Festival.

1961

On 2 March 1961, the Ozbourn entered the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard at Bremerton, Washington to undergo a FRAM Mark I conversion. On 15 March Commander Turner was relieved as commanding officer by Lieutenant Commander D.V. Gorman, the executive officer at the time. On 16 June, LCDR Gorman officially became the commanding officer.

On 2 December, LCDR Gorman was relieved as commanding officer by Commander William W. Lancaster. LCDR Gorman reverted to his former billet as the executive officer. During the FRAM I conversion process, the Ozbourn was refitted with an AS-ROC system (antisubmarine rockets) amidships and helicopter facilities aft, giving the Oz the "New Destroyer Look" of the 1960s. The primary duty of the Ozbourn was anti-submarine warfare.

On 5 and 6 December, the ship successfully completed its INSERV trials. A final trial was held on 18 and 19 December, and the ship's conversion was completed and she was released from the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard as scheduled on 22 December. The ship remained in the Bremerton area after completion until the beginning of February 1962 for post FRAM availability to conduct tests and evaluations of the new equipment.

1962


On 9 February 1962, the Ozbourn departed Bremerton for her new home port of Long Beach, California. On 20 February, the ship began Refresher Training in San Diego. The ship completed its RT on 7 April. The Ozbourn participated in the strike-force exercise dubbed "Pork Barrel" off the coast of Southern California between 14 and 22 May.

The Ozbourn departed the Long Beach Naval Shipyard on 7 June to make her first post-FRAM West Pac cruise.

As the ship prepared to enter Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on 13 June, all hands were on deck on the port side in dress whites to honor the recently dedicated USS Arizona Memorial (May 30, 1962). The Ozbourn was one of the first US Navy ships to render honors to the soul-stirring, stark white memorial, dedicated to the 1,177 men who died during the Japanese attack on December 7, 1941. Ironically, Private Ozbourn is buried at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific not far from the USS Arizona Memorial.

While in Hawaii, the ship participated in the Amphibious Operation Flying Disk off the coast of Oahu between 20 and 23 June. On 25 June, the Ozbourn left Hawaii for duty in the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

In the spring 2006 issue of the *Fireball*, the Gedunk Call question was, what does the term skid row mean? No one was able to provide the correct response so here is the answer. Skid row is not a Navy term although the Ozbourn went through an AZROC Fram I conversion in Bremerton, WA which is just outside of Seattle, home to the Ozbourn's 2007 reunion. The original term has nothing to do with today's connotation of a place where the homeless reside. Skid row refers to the long rows of water chutes that sent logs from the rich timber land above Seattle into Puget Sound . The logs were gathered together and taken to the lumber mills for processing.

1962 continued

On 27 July, the Ozbourn received orders from the USS Oriskany (CVA 34), to head to New Guinea to help local Dutch officials quell a headhunter uprising. The orders were cancelled the next day without any explanation.

On 23 October, received word about the Cuban missile crisis.

While en route to Sasebo, Japan on November 18, the Ozbourn sighted a Japanese fishing boat in distress. The USS Hollister (DD 788), operating with the Ozbourn, towed the vessel safely into Sasebo.

The Ozbourn pulled out of Yokosuka, Japan for Long Beach. A typhoon greeted the Ozbourn on her way home. On 11 December, she experienced 20-25-foot waves, taking green water over the stacks. Sustained winds ranged between 50-55 knots with gusts up to 70 knots. At 0100, the Ozbourn took a 47-degree roll. On 21 December, the Ozbourn moored at Pier 16, Long Beach Naval Shipyard.

1963

The Ozbourn operated in local waters off the coast of Long Beach and San Diego until March 1963.

On 5 March, the Ozbourn left Long Beach with the USS Small (DD 838) on a special mission. The mission of the two-ship convoy was to escort the USS Constellation (CVA 64) to duty in the Western Pacific and to escort the USS Kitty Hawk (CVA 63) from Japan to the United States.

After crossing the International Dateline on 15 March, the small convoy was being shadowed by Soviet Bear bombers. On 16 March, the USS Constellation was buzzed by a reconnaissance version of the Bear bomber. The Ozbourn's commanding officer, Commander Lancaster asked this author to film the Bear Bomber flying by the Oz. The plane flew close enough to see the expression on the pilot's face.

The Ozbourn returned to Long Beach from her quick, Western Pacific cruise on 1 April.

In May, the Ozbourn joined Task Group 10 to prepare for a major presidential demonstration which would display the power and versatility of the First Fleet AAW and ASW forces. The Ozbourn was selected from all First Fleet destroyers as the AS-ROC firing control ship for the antisubmarine portion of the exercises.

President John F. Kennedy, from a grandstand seat on the flight deck of the USS Kitty Hawk (CVA 63), watched as the Ozbourn successfully launched her ASROC on 6 June.

During the summer months, the Ozbourn served as night plane guard for the USS Hornet (CVS 12), USS Bennington (CVS 20), USS Midway (CVA 42), and the USS Ticonderoga (CVA 14). The Oz also provided services for the Pacific Fleet Marine Force, expending nearly 1,000 rounds of five-inch ammunition onto San Clemente Island.

Between 9-21 September, the Ozbourn departed Long Beach with elements from DESRON 11 and DES-RON 23, joining the USS Hornet (CVS 12) in a new and unfamiliar roll in which the Ozbourn had participated in her first HUK group. Task group 31.8, as it was called, participated in exercise Saddle Soap. **Cont. on page 7**

Twenty-one ships and dozens of aircraft, including units from the Canadian Pacific Fleet, conducted a full-scale war game of the ASW mission.

The Ozbourn barely had time to catch her breath from operation "Saddle Soap" when an INSURV inspection team boarded, and found the ship in good condition, ready for sea duty and war if needed.

On 3 October, Commander W. Lancaster was relieved by Commander David W. Berger as the commanding officer of the Ozbourn.

Commander Berger took his new command to sea the following Monday for two weeks of ASW training in company with the USS Yorktown (CVS 10), DES-DIV 112 and CORTRON 3. The HUK group, working with the USS Bluegill (SS 242) conducted several exercises under extremely adverse weather conditions.

On 12 October, while refueling alongside the Yorktown, a collision occurred between the carrier and the Oz. Three whip-lash antennas on the Yorktown were bent while the port screw guard on the Ozbourn was punched through the side of the ship. The Oz was taking on water every time the fantail dipped into the water. The damage control crew shored up the leak. The seas continued to roil beneath the Ozbourn and on 14 October, the Oz took a 46-degree roll to starboard.

The Ozbourn was at sea off the coast of Long Beach on November 22, when the Oz received a message that President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was assassinated by, at that time, an unknown assailant. The ship went to general quarters and it was not a drill. It was believed that the assassination might have been a Soviet plot to kill the president and that there might be an eminent Soviet attack on the United States. The next day, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara sent an unclassified naval message regarding the assassination (see copy of message on page 6).

1964

During January, the Ozbourn participated in a major fleet exercise "Operation Turk's Head" and received a letter of commendation from CO-MASWGRU 5, Rear Admiral Caldwell.

In February, the Oz entered Long Beach Naval Shipyard for a shipyard overhaul. During this period, major repairs were accomplished along with the installation of new, modern equipment. After leaving the shipyard in May, the ship underwent six weeks of intensive underway Refresher Training conducted by COMFLETRAGRU San Diego.

On 8 July, the Ozbourn sailed independently for Pearl Harbor to join ASW Group 1 and DESDIV 233 to spend six months in the Western Pacific. On 10 July, Commander Berger was injured at sea and urgently required a transfer to the nearest hospital facilities for medical attention. On 11 July. the USS General Edwin P. Patrick, a MSTS passenger liner, met with the Ozbourn where a difficult night transfer by motor whaleboat was successfully completed. The XO, LCDR Marvin D. Nelson, Jr. assumed temporary command of the Ozbourn. After a short stay in Pearl Harbor, during which COM-DESDIV 233 shifted his flag to the Ozbourn, the ship sailed to Yokosuka, Japan. CDR Burger's injuries proved to be serious enough to prevent him from reassuming command. On 7 August, LCDR Nelson relieved CDR Berger as CO.

After six days in Yokosuka, ASW-GRU 1 sailed for the South China Sea, on alert after North Vietnamese PT boats attacked the U.S. destroyers Maddox and Turner Joy in the Gulf of Tonkin. After 31 continuous days of ASW protection for Task Force 77, ASWGRU 1 put into Subic Bay, P. I.

On the morning of 17 September, while on life guard station for an underway replenishment, a helo from the USS Kearsarge (CVS 33) crashed in the water dead ahead of the Ozbourn. Seven minutes later, the helo's crew of four were hauled aboard the ship's motor whaleboat. After extinguishing an engine fire on the helo, recovery operations were attempted to save it. Unfortunately, the helo sank.

On 1 December, the Oz, along with other units of the Seventh Fleet,
