Dear Rick:

Global Climate change due to human-induced "greenhouse gas" emissions, mainly carbon dioxide, has been much in the news recently, but is the claim true? As some of our members may know, I have been engaged in various aspects of atmospheric science research for almost half a century. In fact, my latest work on the electrical properties of Jupiter's atmosphere, was published in the *Journal of Geophysical research*— *Planets* in April 2008. I have also researched the issue of climate change caused by greenhouse gases during the last 15 years. I, and roughly 3,000 plus other atmospheric scientists and climatologists, have signed the "Oregon Petition" originated by former President of the National Academy of Science, Frederick Seitz, and sponsored by the George C. Marshall Institute.

Indeed, over 31,000 scientists of all specialties have signed it. This petition refutes the claim that serious climate change due to greenhouse gas emissions is imminent or likely in the future. I have published in the *California Political Review*, May/June 2008 a paper on the topic "Global Warming — Myths and Realities" as it affects the California economy through recent acts of the legislature. A second paper, on the national security aspect of large reductions in greenhouse gas emissions, will be published in the fall issue of the *St. Croix Review*. FIRST POST SHAKE-DOWN AND WEST PAC CRUISE AS TOLD BY CHARLES (CHARLIE) BELL (1946-48)

Editor's note: I interviewed Charles Bell by phone in August with the intention of placing the interview, along with photos provided by Charlie, in the fall *Fireball*.

I received a call from Charlie's wife Lois in late September with some very sad news. Charlie had passed away on September 23, just weeks past his 80th birthday The Bell's were married for 59 years. They first met in elementary school and knew each other for more than 75 years.



here was a group of us which included me (Charlie Bell) (46-48), Paul Logan (46-47), Robert Richards (46-48), and {(no first names given) Broderick, Jackson, Hokes, and Smith (a YN from Sacramento, Ca.)}, who were assigned to the USS Ozbourn's shake-down cruise to Guantanamo, Cuba. We were waiting in Norfolk, Va. to board the ship.

For some reason, the ship didn't pick us up and steamed on without us. This happened around March 1946.

Charlie Bell — 1928-2008

The Navy sent all of us up to the Boston Naval Ship-yard for the Ozbourn's maiden voyage. The ship's captain was CDR B.A. Smith who was a junior destroyer captain in the Navy. The West Coast needed another destroyer in San Diego, Ca. and the Ozbourn was selected to fill that billet. I thought that I would spend my Navy career on the East Coast near my home in Rhode Island. But I also wanted to see the world and asked for a ship that would let me fulfill my dream.

Commander Bernard A. Smith was the first to assume command of the new destroyer. In August 1946 he took the ship from Boston, down the East Coast, across the Caribbean Sea, through the Panama Canal, and up the West Coast to her new home port of San Diego, California.

On 6 January 1947, the Ozbourn departed from San Diego for her first tour of duty in the Far East.

During the maiden voyage, the Ozbourn was instrumental in saving a Chinese oil tanker that was in distress. By attaching a cable to the tanker, the Ozbourn towed it to Kieran, Formosa.

In May 1947, while en route to the La Perouse Straits, the Ozbourn again came to the aid of a distressed vessel. A merchant ship ran aground and later broke in half. The Ozbourn picked up the crew and transported them safely to Yokosuka, Japan.

Getting back to the West Pac cruise, once we passed the International Dateline going west, we had to be very careful. We were blowing up mines left over from WWII.

The Ozbourn visited Nagasaki, Japan a year and onehalf after the atomic bomb was dropped by the U.S. The city was still flattened from the affects of the thermal nuclear fireball.

We visited the Imperial Palace in Tokyo and saw the gold throne of Emperor Tojo. The Imperial Palace was very elegant.

During our cruise, we rescued a Philippine ship that had run onto a reef. We illuminated the night sky with flares to keep the ship in our sight. A Russian navy ship got there before we did, however, we rescued the Philippine crew before the Russians could intervene. The Philippine crew said that the Russians had their guns trained on us the whole time.

We had a mascot dog on the ship that we picked up before we left San Diego. We called him Sparky. Sparky would follow this second class gunner's mate by the name of Joe Montana (no relation to the famous football player or Hanna Montana). Sparky had the run of the ship and was taken care of by everybody. When we reached Tsingtao, China, we didn't let Sparky out of our sight because we believed that the starving Chinese would kill, skin and eat Sparky.

The Ozbourn returned to San Diego in October 1947. On 21 October, CDR Smith was relieved as commanding officer by CDR Norman E. Blaisdell.

It wasn't until years latter that I realized how historic it was to be part of the ship's crew on the very first West Pac cruise of the USS Ozbourn.





A Naval Academy chaplain conducted the service, highlighted by the insightful and thought provoking remarks of classmate and former CNO Admiral Carl Trost who related the engaging personality, exemplary leadership attributes and distinguished career of Curtis Anderson. This most impressive ceremony was concluded with a perfect rendition of Taps by a Navy bugler on Cemetery Hill overlooking the Columbarium site.

Curtis Anderson served on active duty for 35 years and commanded many ships and stations during his career. He was an ensign and Lt. j.g. on the Ozbourn between 1953-55.





The book Korea R e m e m b e r e d: Enough of a War!, the USS Ozbourn's First Tour, 1950-1951, is a first-hand account by shipmate Charles F. Cole, as the war "sandwiched between WW II and the War in Vietnam."

Cole's historic account was first published in 1995, just in time for the dedication of the Korean War Memorial, which is in site of the Vietnam Wall in Washington, D.C.



While the book mainly focuses on Cole's life aboard the Ozbourn during the Korean War, it also includes some of the time he spent as a UDT team member and his Navy Reserve years. The book is no longer in print through Yucca Tree Press.

Charles Cole has graciously donated a box of his book *Korea Remembered: Enough of a War!, the USS Ozbourn's First Tour, 1950-1951* to the USS Ozbourn Association. The proceeds from the sale of his book will go into the Association's treasury.

PENTAGON MEMORIAL

"We claim this ground in remembrance of the events of September 11, 2001.

To honor the 184 people whose lives were lost, their families, and all who sacrifice that we may live in freedom. We will never forget."

The Pentagon Memorial was publicly dedicated September 11, 2008. It is open to the public 24/7. The design of the memorial is simple yet powerful. There is an immediate sense of sorrow when you enter the grounds. The rows of memorial benches are arrayed in order of birth year from the youngest victim to oldest. The benches for the 59 people aboard the plane point toward the Pentagon. The benches for the 125 people in the Pentagon point in the opposite direction.
