
PLANK OWNER REACHES OUT

Ozbourn in Action-Operation Linebacker '72 (Cont.)

Operation Pocket Money

Operation Pocket Money, the mining campaign against the principal North Vietnamese Ports, was launched on 9 May 1972: target Haiphong Harbor. Early that morning, aircraft were launched from Da Nang airfield, and the aircraft carriers Kitty Hawk and Coral Sea

who launched aircraft minutes apart all closely choregraphed and timed to arrive at their destinations at the same time President Nixon announced the renewed bombing of the North and the mining of Haiphong during a nationwide broadcast. Each of the aircraft launched from the Coral Sea carried four of the sophisticated MK 52-2 mines pre-set to go live 72 hours later in accordance of the Geneva Convention accord of providing advanced notice to mariners. The first mine was dropped at 0908 hours and the last of the field of 36 mines laid at 0909 hours. Twelve mines were placed in the inner harbor and the remaining 24 in the outer harbor. All MK 52-2 mines were set with 72-hour arming delays, thus permitting merchant ships time for departure or a change in destination consistent with the President's public warning:

'I have ordered the following measures, which are being implemented as I am speaking to you. All entrances to North Vietnamese ports will be mined to prevent access to these ports and North Vietnamese naval operations from these ports. United States forces have been directed to take appropriate measures within international and claimed territorial waters of North Vietnam to interdict the delivery of supplies. Rail and all communications will be cut off to the maximum extent possible.'

President Nixon's Address to the Nation, 9:00pm, May 9, 1972

It was the beginning of a mining campaign that planted over 11,000 MK 36 type destructors and 108 special MK 52-2 mines over the next eight months. It played a significant role in bringing about an eventual peace arrangement, particularly since it so hampered the enemy's ability to continue receiving war supplies.

Operation Linebacker I, (May 10-October 23, 1972)

The overall objective of Linebacker for navy surface forces was to disrupt enemy lines of communications and support of ongoing air strikes. In addition to interdicting supply ships, Navy Task Forces of up to 14 ships conducted high speed gunfire attacks, often at night, against troop concentrations, AAA and known SAM missile sites, coastal defense sites, supply depots, and command and control centers North of the DMZ. All were within range of NVA coastal defense sites, AA sites and Migs. Raiding ships frequently were fired on and in total, 16 ships were hit during *Linebacker*.

The Ozbourn actively participated in operations supporting all four objectives primarily as a member of a surface raid group of destroyers and cruisers.

Between 10 May and 23 October 1972, the Department of the Navy suffered combined loss of 53 aircraft between the Navy and Marine Corp, two-thirds of which were downed by anti-aircraft fire. In response to this, *Linebacker* surface raid mission packages were adjusted to include additional strikes against AA batteries.

Some notable outcomes and results were:

- 1) The fleet surface force was a prime factor in driving the Democratic Republic of (North) Vietnam negotiators back to the negotiation table and bringing the U.S. Government's involvement in the war to an end.
- 2) During the *Linebacker* campaigns, the fleet's search and rescue units recovered 30 downed naval air crewmen.
- 3) Newport News' 8-inch gun barrel exploded, eventually killing 20 sailors and injuring another 36. The accident represented the single largest loss to the squadron during the Vietnam War. The cause of the explosion was a faulty detonating fuse. Ozbourn was operating with the Newport News and conducting a surface raid at the time of the explosion and forced to retire to the rally point.
- 4) In all, enemy fire hit 16 U.S. Navy ships during 1972-the deadliest year of the war for the Navy's gunfire support force.


