


"BROKEN ARROW-VOLUME II"

CAPTAINS NEWSLETTER

USS OZBOURN (DD 846) Fleet Post Office San Francisco, California

1 May 1967

To the family and friends of the USS OZBOURN (DD 846)

No doubt all of you have recently read about OZBOURN in your local newspapers or heard about the ship on the radio or on TV. Let me re-emphasize that there were no personnel casualties aboard the OZBOURN. One of my happiest moments comes whenever I can pin a medal on an OZBOURN sailor. I am even happier in this case that none of the awards recommended is a Purple Heart.

To bring you up to date with OZBOURN's activities for the first three months of 1967: We spent the first two weeks of January in Yokosuka recovering from the Christmas holidays and New Year's festivities. In mid-January we transited to Subic Bay where we joined forces with the nuclear powered aircraft carrier, USS ENTERPRISE (CVA(N) 65), and USS BAINBRIDGE (DLG(N) 25). For the first two weeks of February we provided escort and ready rescue services for the ENTERPRISE on Yankee Station in the Gulf of Tonkin. We returned home to Yokosuka on the 20th of February and commenced preparation for two annual inspections. All hands worked long and hard hours and the ship passed both inspections.

Underway again in early March from Yokosuka, we arrived in Buckner Bay, Okinawa, for fuel two days later on the 5th. The stop in Buckner Bay allowed all hands to celebrate the OZBOURN's 21st birthday with a party on the mess decks. The commissary personnel, notably Commissaryman Third Class Ronald JENKINS, prepared a colossal cake which was cut with a ceremonial sword by Radioman First Class Harden R. HARRIS, the oldest man on board (46); Fireman Larry E. HIGHSMITH, the youngest man on board (18); Interior Communications Chief Edward G. GATLIN, the "Plank Owner" (the person who has been on board OZBOURN the longest); Master Chief Steam Propulsionman Lloyd E. WOODS, the Senior Chief; and the Commanding Officer.

OZBOURN again joined the carrier task force in the Gulf of Tonkin on March 9th when we rendezvoused with USS KITTY HAWK (CVA 63), at Yankee Station. We escorted KITTY HAWK for only four days before being ordered to proceed south to the Vietnamese coast to join the Naval Gunfire Support Task Group on the gunline. OZBOURN fired gunfire support missions for U.S. Marine Corps and U.S. Army spotters along the coast south of DaNang for two weeks. While on the gunline on Sunday the 19th of March, the ship took a holiday and had an afternoon cook-out on the fantail. At this picnic there were no flies to chase away from the food, but U.S. Army helicopters kept bussing around trying to get a bite of the hamburgers, hot dogs, potato salad and baked beans that comprised the menu.

On 23 March we moved to a position further up the Vietnamese Coast to provide support for U.S. Marines who were engaged in Operation Beacon Hill I near the Demilitarized Zone. OZBOURN arrived on station on the evening of the 24th and immediately commenced patrolling and providing

gunfire support for U.S. Marines ashore. At 8:17 the next morning the enemy struck back. Enemy mortars started firing at OZBOURN from hidden positions and almost immediately OZBOURN commenced evasive action and started firing her guns in reply. During the action OZBOURN took two direct hits which damaged a radar room and a storage rea, starting fires in both spaces. The flames were quickly extinguished and OZBOURN headed for Subic Bay for repairs due to damage to sensitive equipment.

I was extremely proud, as you can be, of the way in which each and every man on board OZBOURN reacted to the combat situation and performed his duties. Though everyone performed in a highly professional manner, special note must be paid to certain individuals who performed heroic acts under adverse conditions and are largely responsible for the fact that damage was kept to a minimum, and most important, that there were no personnel injuries. Soon after the second hit, a serious fire broke out in a storage area. Shipfitter Third Class Daniel S. SCOTT immediately reported to the scene with a fire hose and commenced applying water with a fire hose into the affected space. Without regard to his own safety, SCOTT, in spite of the flames and the enemy shells which were exploding around the ship, fought the fire until it was brought under control. Only one entrance to the space was opened. A second entrance was locked from the inside and could not be opened from the outside. It was necessary to have both accesses opened to allow fire fighting personnel to enter the space to completely put out the fire. Shipfitter Third Class Michael D. DENT who had been on the scene from the beginning with SCOTT quickly donned a gas mast and without regard to his own safety in the intense heat, entered the smoke filled space and proceeded to the second access hatch. He found the hatch and opened it, allowing the other fire fighters to enter the space. The quick actins of several other members of the crew also were largely responsible for quickly extinguishing the fire: Gunner's Mate First Class Robert D. GAUGER, Gunner's Mate First Class Ferdinand F. VORHEES, and Aviation Electronics Technician First Class Carl L. AYERS quickly activated the sprinkling system to the space and then reported to the scene of the fire to assist the damage control parties. Many other men participated in this necessary dangerous task. To tell all the heroic acts would takes pages. To name a few more of the most responsible:

Ensign Alan W. SWINGER Senior Chief Sonarman Donald I. MC CARTHY Electrician's Mate First Class William P. KENNEDY Gunner's Mate Third Class David A. GLANSMAN Fireman Charles S. PERRY Fireman James E. WORTHINGTON

We have now completed repairs at Subic Bay and are READY again for whatever duties the Navy has planned for us. It is hoped that our encounter with the enemy has not alarmed you. You may rest assured that your ship is ready to undertake any assigned task necessary to safe-guard the lives of U.S. personnel ashore. OZBOURN was built to go into harm's way. She has been equipped by your tax payers' dollars to be capable of coping with whatever the enemy may try to do. The men in OZBOURN

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are trained to accomplish any assigned task. It is these men that make me proud and enable me to report to Commander U.S. SEVENTH Fleet that OZBOURN is again READY for duty as assigned.
