

Therefore, the USS Ozbourn DD846 Association would be joining the Tin Can Sailors Association Reunion to be held in New Orleans, September 8-12, 2024.

However, as discussions with the Tin Can Sailors Association continued, it has become clear that retaining our own USS Ozbourn Association Reunions, separate from the Tin Can Sailors Association, would be the best course of action for our Association at this time.

Therefore, our 2025 Reunion Committee, **Guy Posey, President, Harold McKeehan, Vice President, and Mike Ward, Treasurer**, once again working tirelessly in researching venues throughout the Eastern portion of our great country that would be both fiscally responsible as well as of great interest to all Shipmates, Friends and Families.

Once again, the Reunion Committee has found a fantastic venue, **Warwick, Rhode Island**, with which to hold our 2025 Reunion.

As the exhaustive planning stage continues, excursions, busses, meals, etc. the Committee has identified the Crown Plaza Hotel Warwick, located at 801 Greenwich Avenue, Warwick, Rhode Island. (401) 732-6000, as our host hotel for the reunion. The Committee has established a nightly rate of 149.00 that includes breakfast each morning, a hospitality room as well as complimentary airport transportation, from the Warwick Airport.




"A VERY SMALL WORLD"


As I have printed this article in the past, (2016 Fall Edition), I believe it is great to recognize publications such as **SEA CLASSICS**, that I truly enjoy each month. Sea Classics tackles many of the historical events involving navies from around the globe as well as current events that I believe our Shipmates will find both enlightening as well as interesting.



USS *Ozbourn* (DD-846) steaming for a rendezvous during May 1963 with USS *Kitty Hawk* (CV-62). On 3 June 1963, President Kennedy, standing on the deck of *Kitty Hawk*, will observe *Ozbourn* fire a missile from her ASROC launcher. From the lack of sailors in the picture standing on *Ozbourn*'s main deck, below ASROC launcher, we know it is not mealtime. Entrance to the Mess Deck was from a hatch on the port side of the ship located inside the superstructure just to the rear of the breakwater. The exit from the mess hall was from a similar hatch on the starboard side. One went down the hatch to the steam line, got one's food, went into the Mess to eat, and then exited through the scullery, where your tray was washed. The Mess Deck could only seat 40 crewmembers so it was eat and leave so your buddy to could eat. Those going on watch got in the front of the line, those not having watch next in line, and those coming off watch at the rear of the line.


An American Destroyer: USS Hamner History in Photographs

The sequel to "An American Destroyer: USS Hamner (DD-718)", by Patty Hathaway, presents the history of the Hamner and her crew with photographs and documents from shipmates and their families. With over 400 photographs, the reader is taken back to 1945 when Hamner began her life on the sea. The history unfolds from the shipmates' perspective, with graphic details words could not quite describe. The photographs show the shipmates from their training to life onboard, with a few well-earned times of liberty in exotic places. The photographs and copies of documents shared by our veterans and their families prove that a picture is worth a thousand words -- and in this book, that's 400 times a thousand! In the author's own words:

An American Destroyer: USS Hamner (DD-718)



Written by Kenneth Ericksen (ET3, 1953-56), this book tells the story of the ship and her crew from the launch of the Hamner in 1946 until her decommissioning in 1979. Ken gathered the information about the family of the Hamner's namesake, photos from fellow shipmates, deck logs and cruise books, interviews of other shipmates and started writing the history of the Hamner in order to keep her memory alive. All nineteen cruises, equator crossings and training exercises can be found in Ken's story. After the Vietnam war, reservist training on the Columbia River occupies the crew and their ship in the later chapters. **An American Destroyer** shows the life aboard a destroyer through the eyes of a sailor. In Ken's own words:

"All that being said, this is the story of an American destroyer, USS Hamner (DD-718), and her service in major wars and as a training vessel during peacetime. It's also the story of the men who served aboard and knew her well. I dedicate this book to those brave sailors."

NOTE: All profits from the sale of these books go to the USS Hamner DD-718 Association Inc to enable them to continue their mission of preserving the memories of the Hamner and her crew.
